





In a nutshell: School development concept for intercultural parent work

A school development concept for intercultural parent work is an important step in promoting co-operation between schools and parents from different cultural backgrounds.

Here are some key points that should be considered in such a concept:

- 1. objective
- Promoting integration: The aim is to create an interculturally open school community in which all parents, regardless of their origin, can actively participate in school life.

2. needs analysis

- Workshops and training courses: Offers for parents to strengthen them in their role, e.g. on topics such as support with learning at home or dealing with challenges at school.
- Establishment of a pool of interpreters to improve understanding and build intercultural bridges in discussions between home and school
- 4. cooperation with cultural institutions
- Cooperation with non-profit organisations: Collaborate with local stakeholders who advocate for immigrant issues to gain resources and support.















- Involvement of cultural professionals: Inviting artists or speakers from different cultures to bring cultural diversity into the school.

5. Fyaluation and feedback

- Regular evaluation: Reviewing the measures and their effectiveness through surveys or feedback discussions with parents and teachers.
- Adaptation of the concept: Based on the results of the evaluation, adjustments should be made in order to continuously improve the work with parents.

6. Sustainability

- Long-term strategies: Development of long-term strategies to permanently anchor and further develop intercultural parent work.
- Creation of an intercultural steering group: Formation of a team of teachers and parents to deal specifically with intercultural issues.

Conclusion: Such a concept can help to promote understanding and co-operation between school and parents and create a positive learning environment for all pupils. It is important that all stakeholders are actively involved in the process to create a true intercultural community.
